Getting to Know Me

□ What is the junkiest car you've ever owned? When was that?

Into the Bible

□ What one thing stood out to you in this week's sermon as something important to understand and apply?

- □ Who are "the spirits now in prison" (vv. 19-20)? What did Christ preach to them? And when did He do this preaching? (These are questions that have been debated since the 1st Century, and we can't be certain. But we shouldn't let that keep us from seeking to understand God's Word for our edification.) Read and compare Gen. 6:1-4; Job 1:6; 2:1; Matt. 25:41; Col. 2:15; Heb. 2:14-16; 2 Pet. 2:4-6; Jude 6-7; Rev. 9:1-2, 11; 20:1-3.
- □ Verse 20 is one of the places in the Bible (along with Acts 2:38 & Rom. 10:9-10) that is most responsible for the enduring misinterpretation of baptism as necessary for salvation. The Catholic Church, Eastern Orthodox Church, Mormons, Lutheran, Episcopal, Disciples of Christ, United Pentecostal, and Seventh Day Adventist, among others, teach this. What would you say to someone from one of these groups to help dissuade them from this error? (Hint: See John 3:5, 7, 16; Acts 16:30-31; Eph. 2:8-10)
- □ 1 Peter is all about keeping our faith strong in times of suffering. The believers to whom Peter was writing were undergoing fiery persecutions (4:12-14). How does 3:18-22, which is about Christ's triumph through suffering, encourage us as we see potential for persecution increasing if Christ tarries?

- □ Does the fact that there are passages in the Bible that so many disagree about make it hard for you to have confidence in your interpretation of the Bible? How can you address these doubts?
- □ If persecution is coming our way sometime soon, what might we do now to prepare for it? How have Christians in the past prepared for persecution and dealt with it?
